BY ANITA DIAMANT

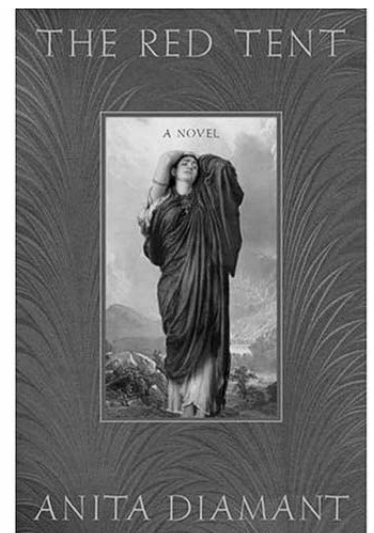
SUNDAY, OCTOBER 25 • 10:00 A.M.

Congregant Ruth Adler will lead a discussion of the *New York Times* bestseller, "The Red Tent," by Anita Diamant. A historical fiction, *The Red Tent* retells the little-known story of Dinah from a first-person narrative.

The daughter of the patriarch, Jacob, and his wife, Leah, and the sister of Joseph, Dinah is a talented midwife and feminist whose story is recounted in Genesis under the "Rape of Dinah." While Dinah does not say a word in the Old Testament, she finds her voice in this vivid evocation from the world of Biblical women. "The Red Tent" is told entirely from Dinah's perspective and the women around her.

A perennial book club favorite, the novel has been published in 25 countries with translations into 20 languages. "Diamant vividly conjures up the ancient world of caravans, farmers, midwives, slaves and artisans ... her Dinah is a compelling narrator that has timeless resonance," writes the *Christian Science Monitor*.

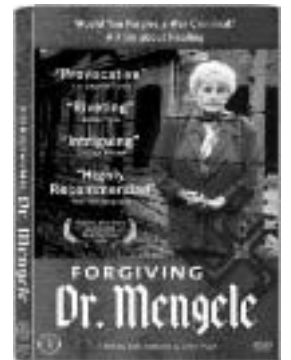
FILM & DISCUSSION

"FORGIVING DR. MENGELE"

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 1 • 7:00 P.M.

Get ready for an exciting and thought-provoking evening at Temple Jeremiah. In response to a recent congregational survey that reflected a desire for movies comes the first of what we hope will be a series of film events that will give you much to think and talk about.

"Forgiving Dr. Mengele," an 80-minute independent documentary released in 2007, centers around a shocking act of forgiveness by Auschwitz survivor, Eva Mozes Kor, and the firestorm of criticism it created. Eva and her twin sister, Miriam, were among the victims of Dr. Josef Mengele's cruel genetic experiments - an experience that would haunt them the rest of their lives. Eva's public decision to forgive the Nazis, including Dr. Mengele, in order to heal herself ignited an impassioned debate about forgiveness. The film follows Eva as she advocates for her right to decide for herself whom she can and cannot forgive while continuing to be a tireless Holocaust educator. The agenda turns into a political crusade as fellow survivors label her a traitor.



Thrusting itself into the debate on how Jews in general and Holocaust survivors in particular should view the perpetrators of Nazi atrocities, "Forgiving Dr. Mengele" asks the question, "Can you forgive but not forget?"

In the season of the High Holy Days with its focus on atonement and repentance, this program will challenge ideas about forgiveness, compassion and community. Award-winning filmmaker Bob Hercules will lead a discussion following the movie.

The program is offered to Jeremiah congregants at no charge and to non-congregants at \$10 per person.
