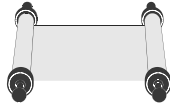
# ONGOING PROGRAMS

### "JEWS AND MUSLIMS IN THE ARAB WORLD"

Dr. Jacob Lassner, Professor of Jewish Civilization at Northwestern University, will talk about his recent book, *Jews and Muslims in the Arab World: Haunted by Pasts Real and Imagined*. The book, which Dr. Lassner co-authored with S. Ilan Troen of Brandeis University, examines the effects of historical memory on the Arab-Israeli conflict. It has received international acclaim from the academic community.



Dr. Lassner looks at how Jews and Arabs use stories of distant pasts to create their identities and shape their politics. Whether real or imagined, the past, filtered through their collective memories, has influenced and continues to influence how Jews and Arabs perceive themselves and each other.

Dr. Lassner is the author of seven previous books, most recently *The Middle East Remembered*. He has written numerous articles on Jewish-Muslim relations and Near Eastern History. Copies of *Jews and Muslims in the Arab World* will be available for purchase at the temple.

**STANLEY C. GOLDER INTERFAITH LECTURE**  
**“THE RISE OF RELIGIOUS FUNDAMENTALISM”**  
**WITH AWARD-WINNING JOURNALIST JUDITH MILLER**

**Saturday, May 3 • 8:00 p.m.**

This year's keynote speaker, Judith Miller, will address the rise of religious fundamentalism in the three major Western faiths - Judaism, Islam and Christianity - over the past three decades. This phenomenon is seen as a powerful force in today's highly charged political arena.

A well-known author and Pulitzer Prize winning investigative reporter, Ms. Miller has worked with journalists of various faiths covering international news and knows first-hand the role religious beliefs can play in news coverage. She will also look at efforts by the international community to promote understanding through programs and dialogue.

Ms. Miller writes for the *Wall Street Journal*, *Los Angeles Times*, *New York Sun* and numerous other publications. As a TV commentator, she speaks regularly on national security as it relates to the Middle East and counterterrorism. She also talks on the necessity of striking a delicate balance between protecting national security and preserving civil liberties in a post-9/11 world, a topic with which she is intimately familiar. As a reporter for the *New York Times*, Ms. Miller spent 85 days in jail rather than disclose her confidential sources. She has since resigned from the newspaper and is working to enact a federal "shield" law to protect the relationship between reporters and their sources versus the public's right to know.



Ms. Miller is the author of *God Has Ninety-Nine Names: A Reporter's Journey Through a Militant Middle East* and the co-author of *Germs: Biological Weapons and America's Secret War*. To learn more about Ms. Miller, log on to her web site at <http://judithmiller.org>.
